Minutes of the PAR Team Meeting held Nov. 4, 2000 at SGEU

- 1. Members of the Research Team were welcomed. Bula expressed the pleasure of the Team to see things moving forward.
- 2. PTSD Brochure -
- There was a general discussion of the intended purpose of the brochure. Information may be obtained through the research that should be included. The consensus was that, if Nayyar has not already done the brochure, it should be considered a product of the research to be completed at the end of the project.

Action: Judy White will check with Nayyar

- 3. Focus groups
 - a) <u>Dates</u>: Focus groups will be conducted in January.
- Anne advised that one of the psychiatrists in Swift Current will be away in January.
- Action: Anne Moola will find out the exact dates the psychiatrist will be away and advise Judy.
 - a) <u>Facilitators:</u> Judy will conduct all focus groups.
